**BACKGROUND:** The Power Department has 152 miles of power lines throughout the City and served from 7 different substations. The circuits have strategic locations for gang operated switches (GOS) to pick up load from other circuits, however, the GOS are manually operated.

### Distribution Automation (DA) Project




### Introduction

- Distribution Automation is basically a self healing process during power outages.
- Strategically placed automatic switches on the power lines will restore as many customers as possible during a feeder outage.
- There are 3 basic stages of the system: detection, isolation, and restoration.



### Background

- College Park Power serves about 8400 customers from 8 different substations but 5 substations serve 98%.
- There are 27 circuits feeding the entire City area.
- All substations have re-feed options with 108 gang operated switches in place.



## Present vs DA Comparison (night outage)

Present:

- Circuit locks out at a substation from a fallen tree.
- Crew is dispatched to find the fault = 40 minutes
- After fault is located and requires extensive repairs, crew moves to isolate fault = 15 minutes.
- Crew opens GOS #1 for section that has fault = 10 minutes
- Crew closes GOS #2 to pick up part of the circuit = 10 minutes
- Outage time for customers not on faulted section = 75 minutes




### Present vs DA Comparison

### Automated:

- Circuit locks out at a substation from a fallen tree.
- Fault indicators communicate with switching devices to determine location of fault. Auto switch #1 opens to isolate = 2 minutes
- Auto switch #2 closes to pick up customers not on faulted section = 30 seconds.
- Outage time for customers not on faulted section = 2.5 minutes






Everything is normal, with circuits hot (red).




Tree falls on Lakemont circuit 1, 3 miles out, opening the substation breaker. 330 customers out.





Down line auto switch A opens to isolate the faulted section = 2 minutes.





Auto switch D from Harvard substation, closes in, picking up 180 customers in less than 30 seconds = 2.5 minutes out.



### Nova Controlled Recloser





### Schedule & Plan

- Initial installation will include 12 reclosers to protect 8 circuits.
- Heavy residential areas will be the first priority of protection
- Delivery of reclosers is 25 weeks: install in July – August 2022.
- Continue to budget more reclosers in 2023 and beyond to expand the protection.

### Mobile Food Vendor Ordinance Highlights

- Mobile Food Vendors must receive a permit from City of College Park to operate within the City
- Special Event Permit needed to operate on public property
- May operate on Private property with consent of the owner given the following:
  - Mobile Food Vendors shall not be located within fifteen (15) feet of any street intersection or pedestrian crosswalk or ten (10) feet of any driveway.
  - Mobile Food Vendors shall not be located within two hundred (200) feet of a restaurant or a Food Retailer
  - Services between the hours of 10:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m. only
  - Mobile Food Vendor may only sell food and non-alcoholic beverage items

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 11 (OCCUPATIONAL LICENSES, TAXES 1 AND REGULATIONS), ARTICLE VIII (PEDDLERS; TRANSIENT MERCHANTS; 2 SOLICITORS AND CANVASSERS) OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE PARK CODE OF 3 ORDINANCES TO REGULATE THE USE OF FOOD TRUCKS IN THE CITY OF 4 COLLEGE PARK; TO PROVIDE FOR SEVERABILITY; TO REPEAL CONFLICTING 5 ORDINANCES; TO PROVIDE AN ADOPTION DATE; TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE 6 7 DATE; AND TO PROVIDE FOR OTHER LAWFUL PURPOSES. WHEREAS, the City of College Park, Georgia (the "City") is a municipal corporation 8 created under the laws of the State of Georgia; and 9 10 WHEREAS, the duly elected governing authority of the City is the Mayor and Council

WHEREAS, the Charter of the City of College Park provides the City of College Park
with broad authority to regulate the use of public roadways in the City. College Park City Charter
Section 2-1; and

WHEREAS, "[t]he streets [and public ways] belong to the public and are primarily for the use of the public in the ordinary way. Their use for the purposes of gain is special and extraordinary, and, generally at least, may be prohibited or conditioned as the legislature deems proper." *Packard v. Banton*, 264 U.S.140, 144 (1924); *Schlesinger v. City of Atlanta*, 129 S.E. 861, 867 (1925) (individuals do not have the inherent right to conduct their private businesses in the streets and public property of a city, and a city may prohibit such business activities); and

21	WHEREAS, Chapter 11 (Occupational Licenses, Taxes and Regulations) of the City
22	Code of Ordinances (the "Code") sets forth the procedures by which businesses may be taxed and
23	regulated in the City; and
24	WHEREAS, Chapter 11, Article VIII (Peddlers; Transient Merchants; Solicitors and
25	Canvassers) provides a framework for regulating businesses that do not operate from a fixed
26	location; and
27	WHEREAS, mobile food vending is an increasingly popular line of business that will
28	provide residents of the City with increased dining options; and
29	WHEREAS, after due consideration, the duly elected governing authority desires to permit
30	limited operation of mobile food vendors in the City; and
31	WHEREAS, the City Council finds that it is necessary to amend the relevant provisions
32	of Chapter 11, Article VIII of the Code <u>to</u> provide a regulatory framework for the limited operation
33	of mobile food vendors in the City.

35	BE IT AND IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF
36	THE CITY OF COLLEGE PARK, GEORGIA, and by the authority thereof:

38	Section 1. The Code of Ordinances, City of College Park, Georgia is hereby amended
39	by revising Chapter 11, Article VIII, Section 11-140 (Definitions), to be read and codified as
40	follows with added text in <b>bold</b> font and deleted text in strikethrough font:
41 42 43	"Sec. 11-140 Definitions. As used in this article, the following terms shall have the respective meanings ascribed to them:

- (1) Transient merchant: Any person who sets up or displays merchandise for sale
- outside of a building on any lot where the person or entity setting up or displaying

46	such merchandise does not also lawfully conduct business regularly in a building
47	located on that lot.
48	(2) Peddler: Any person who solicits, excluding, however:
49	a. Transient merchants;
50	b. Any person who sells agricultural, forestry or other farm products;
51	c. Any person who conducts business at any industry or association trade
52	show;
53	d. Any person who sells items at a rummage, garage, antique or similar sale,
54	or a flea market, where such sale is not part of the regular business activity
55	of such person; and
56	e. Any person who exclusively donates the net proceeds of all sales or
57	moneys otherwise obtained to one (1) or more nonprofit organizations.
58	(3) Solicit To sell products or services, conduct nonprofit activities, or otherwise
59	represent an entity by traveling to customers' homes, places of business or other
60	places where customers are located. shall mean taking orders, selling, or seeking
61	orders or clients for the purchase of goods, wares, merchandise, foodstuffs,
62	products, subscriptions, or services of any kind, character, or description
63	whatsoever.
64	(4) Nonprofit organization: Any tax-exempt organization within the meaning of the
65	Internal Revenue Code or the Georgia Income Tax Law, as such code and such law
66	are now or may be hereafter amended.
67	(5) Nonprofit activities: Solicitation of funds or donations as a peddler or transient
68	merchant for any nonprofit organization.
69	(6) Seasonal items: Christmas trees sold in October, November and December, and
70	pumpkins sold in October.
71	(7) Special Events: Any event sponsored by the city, and any parade permitted by
72	the city.
73	(8) Mobile Food Vendor shall mean a motorized wheeled vehicle or a towed
74	wheeled vehicle designed and equipped to serve food.
75	(9) Food Retailer shall mean a food establishment that sells to consumer
76	customers food or food products intended for preparation or consumption off
77	of the premises.

81	Section 2. The Code of Ordinances, City of College Park, Georgia is hereby amended
82	by revising Chapter 11, Article VIII to add a new Section 11-152, to be read and codified as follows

- 84 "Sec. 11-152 Regulation and Licensing of Mobile Food Vendors.

85	(a) It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, or offer for sale, food of any type from
86	a Mobile Food Vendor without a license first having been granted under this section,
87	except for such activities conducted in connection with city-sponsored events.
88	(b) An application for a permit hereunder shall be submitted to the city clerk or his
89	or her designee setting forth all information required hereunder and in compliance
90	with this ordinance. The city clerk or his or her designee shall develop a form of
91	application for the purpose of compliance with this article. The application shall be
92	accompanied by an executed indemnity agreement indemnifying and releasing the
93	city, its agents, employees and elected officials from any and all liability against any
94	and all claims, actions and suits of any type whatsoever arising in connection with the
95	activities of the Mobile Food Vendor pursuant to the permit issued hereunder.
96	(c) The following information shall be provided with each application for a Mobile
97	Food Vendor permit, along with an executed Release and Indemnification Agreement
98	provided by the city:
99	(1) Name of the Mobile Food Vendor;
100	(2) Make, model and license plate number of vending unit;
101	(3) Owner's contact information;
102	(4) Operator's contact information;
103	(5) Copy of approved permit from the Fulton County Health Department, or,
104	if the Mobile Food Vendor will be operating in the portion of the city located
105	in Clayton, County, the Clayton County Health Department;
106	(6) List of operating locations and times including map detailing the position
107	of the vehicle, and current zoning in said locations;

108	(7) Signatures from property owners indicating consent for the use of their
109	property; and
110	(8) Signature of applicant indicating agreement to the listed requirements.
111	(d) Mobile Food Vendors shall be licensed and taxed in accordance with the
112	provisions of Section 11-145 of the City of College Park Code of Ordinances.
113	(e) No Mobile Food Vendor shall conduct business or operate in the public right-of-
114	way or on public property (including, but not limited to, public parks or public
115	recreation grounds of the city (as defined in Section 13-6(d) of the College Park Code
116	of Ordinances)), without a special event permit Mobile Food Vendors cannot be
117	parked in the public right-of-way, on sidewalks, grass, or areas not intended for
118	parking vehicles.
119	(f) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in Section 13(b) of the College Park
120	Code of Ordinances, persons who are not an employee, officer or agent of the city or
121	a resident of the city may enter public parks or public recreation grounds of the city
122	to make purchases from Mobile Food Vendors lawfully conducting business or
123	operating in public parks or public recreation grounds of the city pursuant to a
124	special event permit.
125	(g) A Mobile Food Vendor may operate on private property subject to the following:
126	(1) the owner must provide prior written consent; and
127	(2) the Mobile Food Vendor must operate in accordance with the distance
128	requirements set forth in Section 11-152(m).
129	A Mobile Food Vendor shall not be allowed to park overnight on any private property
130	without the prior written consent of the owner.

131	(h) Notwithstanding anything in this article to the contrary, a Mobile Food Vendor
132	shall maintain a one million dollar (\$1,000,000.00) liability insurance policy. Proof of
133	current liability insurance, issued by an insurance company licensed to do business in
134	Georgia, protecting the Mobile Food Vendor, the public and the city from all claims
135	for damage to property and bodily injury, including death, which may arise from
136	operation under or in connection with the permit, shall be provided to the city as part
137	of its permit application. If the Mobile Food Vendor does not have insurance, the
138	Mobile Food Vendor may be under the umbrella of an existing business with the
139	business' permission to do so. Such arrangement documentation shall be included
140	with the application to the city.
141	(i) A Mobile Food Vendor shall not make sounds or announcements to call attention
142	to the mobile food vehicle either while traveling on the public rights-of-way or when
143	stationary. At all times said Mobile Food Vendor shall be in compliance with the city's
144	noise ordinance.
145	(j) The license under which a Mobile Food Vendor is operating must be firmly
146	attached and visible on the Mobile Food Vendor at all times.
147	(k) Any driver of a Mobile Food Vendor motorized vehicle must possess a valid
148	Georgia driver's license.
149	(l) Mobile Food Vendors shall not be located within fifteen (15) feet of any street
150	intersection or pedestrian crosswalk or ten (10) feet of any driveway.
151	(m) Mobile Food Vendors shall not be located within two hundred (200) feet of a
152	restaurant or a Food Retailer. Notwithstanding the foregoing:

153	(1) Lif a restaurant (or the corporate entity that owns the restaurant) owns a
154	Mobile Food Vendor, the Mobile Food Vendor may be located within two
155	hundred (200) feet of that restaurant; or
156	(2) If a Mobile Food Vendor is operating pursuant to a special event permit,
157	the Mobile Food Vendor may be located within two hundred (200) feet of a
158	restaurant or a Food Retailer.
159	(n) A Mobile Food Vendor shall not sell or offer to sell any goods, foods, products, or
160	services between the hours of 10:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m.
161	(o) Vending structures shall not be left unattended or stored at any time on the open
162	vending site when vending is not taking place or during restricted hours of operation.
163	(p) Mobile Food Vendors shall comply with all state, federal and local health and
164	safety regulations and requirements and shall obtain and maintain any and all
165	licenses required by any other health organization or governmental organization
166	having jurisdiction over this subject matter.
167	(q) The following safety regulations shall apply to any and all vehicles operating under
168	this article or used for mobile retail food establishments:
169	(1) Every vehicle shall be equipped with a reverse gear signal alarm with a
170	sound distinguishable from the surrounding noise level.
171	(2) Every vehicle shall be equipped with two (2) rear-vision mirrors, one (1) at
172	each side, firmly attached to the outside of the motor vehicle, and so located as
173	to reflect to the driver a view of the highway to the rear, along both sides of
174	the vehicle.

175	(r) A Mobile Food Vendor may only sell food and non-alcoholic beverage items.
176	Notwithstanding the foregoing, a Mobile Food Vendor may offer alcoholic beverages
177	for sale if the Mobile Food Vendor is licensed to sell alcoholic beverages in accordance
178	with the applicable provisions of the City of College Park Code of Ordinances.
179	Alcoholic beverages offered for sale by a Mobile Food Vendor may be consumed in
180	public areas subject to the following conditions:
181	(i) If the alcoholic beverage is consumed in accordance with the provisions of
182	Section 3-3 of the City of College Park Code of Ordinances; or
183	(ii) If the alcoholic beverage is consumed in such public areas as may be
184	designated by the city as permissible for public consumption of alcohol.
185	Section 3. The preamble of this Ordinance shall be considered to be and is hereby
186	incorporated by reference as if fully set out herein.
187	<b>Section 4.</b> (a) It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Mayor and Council that
188	all sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Ordinance are or were, upon their
189	enactment, believed by the Mayor and Council to be fully valid, enforceable and constitutional.
190	(b) It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Mayor and Council that, to the
191	greatest extent allowed by law, each and every section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of
192	this Ordinance is severable from every other section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this
193	Ordinance. It is hereby further declared to be the intention of the Mayor and Council that, to the
194	greatest extent allowed by law, no section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance
195	is mutually dependent upon any other section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this
196	Ordinance.

197 (c) In the event that any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this Ordinance shall, for any reason whatsoever, be declared invalid, unconstitutional or otherwise 198 unenforceable by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, it is the 199 express intent of the Mayor and Council that such invalidity, unconstitutionality or 200 unenforceability shall, to the greatest extent allowed by law, not render invalid, unconstitutional 201 or otherwise unenforceable any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or 202 sections of this Ordinance and that, to the greatest extent allowed by law, all remaining phrases, 203 clauses, sentences, paragraphs and sections of this Ordinance shall remain valid, constitutional, 204 205 enforceable, and of full force and effect.

<u>Section 5.</u> All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly
 repealed to the extent they conflict with this Ordinance.

208 <u>Section 6.</u> The effective date of this Ordinance shall be the date of adoption unless
 209 otherwise specified herein.
